# **1996 STANFORD FOOTBALL THE FINAL REPORT**

## **7-5 overall, 5-3 Pac-10 (3rd Place)**

**THE CARDINAL:** Stanford concluded the 1996 campaign by winning its final five games, including a 38-0 shutout over Michigan State in the Sun Bowl ... The Cardinal advanced to its 18th bowl game in school history by finishing in third place in the Pacific-10 Conference with a 5-3 record ... Stanford's fourth bowl appearance in the last six years ties the Cardinal with two other schools for the most bowl games in the Pac-10 since 1991 ... The five-game winning streak is the longest on the Farm since the '91 club ended the year with seven consecutive wins ... The Cardinal's current string of four bowl games in six years in the best in school history.

**TYRONE WILLINGHAM:** Named the 1995 Pac-10 Coach of the Year, Tyrone Willingham has accomplished what only two other head coaches in school history have - and that's leading Stanford to consecutive bowl games in his first two years as head coach ... Willingham's two-year record at Stanford now stands at 14-9-1 overall and 10-6 in the Pac-10 ... He became the first Stanford head coach to be named conference Coach of the Year since Bill Walsh in 1977 ... Willingham graduated from Michigan State in 1977 after playing both football and baseball for the Spartans ... He has coached at Central Michigan, Michigan State, North Carolina State, Rice, Stanford (as an assistant coach from 1989-91) and the Minnesota Vikings (1992-94) before being named the Cardinal's head coach on December 9, 1994.

**THE SUN BOWL:** In what was the largest margin of victory by Stanford in its bowl game history, the Cardinal turned in a near perfect performance in handing Michigan State a 38-0 beating on New Year's Eve in El Paso, Texas ... Not only did Stanford score touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams, but the Cardinal registered school records for most points scored in a bowl game, largest margin of victory and fewest points allowed (the 1936 Rose Bowl team shutout SMU 7-0) ... QB Chad Hutchinson was named the game's Most Valuable Player after completing 22-of-28 for 226 yards and one touchdown while defensive end Kailee Wong was named the game's Most Valuable Lineman (10 total tackles, two quarterback sacks, three tackles-for-loss and one pass deflection) ... Stanford scored the first Sun Bowl shutout since 1978 and the first shutout by a Cardinal defense since a 17-0 win over Oregon in 1974 ... The 38 point margin of victory was the third highest in Sun Bowl history.

- Stanford made its fourth bowl appearance in the last six years (1991-96), which ties the Cardinal with two other teams for the most bowl games in the Pac-10 Conference during this time ... Only Washington and USC, who have each advanced to four bowls games since '91, have equaled Stanford's total.

- Only Arizona State and Washington have won more Pac-10 games than the Cardinal over the past two seasons ... Stanford has gone 10-6 in Pac-10 play in 1995 and '96 with a fourth place finish in '95 and a third place finish in '96 ... Pac-10 standings for 1995-96 are: ASU 12-4, Washington 13-2-1, Stanford 10-6, USC 9-6-1, Oregon 9-7, UCLA 8-8, Arizona 7-9, WSU and Cal 5-11, OSU 1-15.

**FINISHING STRONG:** In the last eight seasons (1989-96), Stanford owns a 20-6 record in the month of November, including a 6-1 record under Willingham the past two seasons ... Stanford finished the 1996 season by beating UCLA, USC, Washington State and California in the month of November ... The Cardinal has had only two seasons (1993, 1994) during this time in which it did not post a winning record in November ... In 1995, Stanford lost at USC 31-30 on Nov. 4, then finished the regular season by beating Washington State and Cal ... With its perfect 4-0 November record in 1996, Stanford has now won six straight November games over the last two seasons ... In Willingham's three years as a Cardinal assistant coach (1989-91), Stanford was 9-1 in November, including a 4-0 mark in 1991, 3-0 in 91 and a 2-1 reading in 1989 ... In his five seasons at Stanford, Willingham's teams are 15-2 in November.

**THE STREAK:** Stanford found itself 2-5 overall and 1-3 in the Pac-10 on Oct. 26 after a 41-9 loss to Arizona State ... Since that game, however, the Cardinal won five straight games over UCLA, USC, Washington State, Cal and Michigan State in the Norwest Sun Bowl ... The five game winning streak is the longest on The Farm since the 1992 team finished the year by winning its final four ... In Stanford's first three wins (UCLA, USC, WSU), the Cardinal had to come-from-behind to pull out the victory ... Stanford trailed UCLA 20-14 late in the fourth quarter before mounting an impressive 10-play, 80-yard drive that culminated in a Chad Hutchinson to Brian Manning 10-yard TD pass with 58 seconds left in the game ... Against the Trojans, Stanford trailed 20-7 at half-time, but outscored USC 17-0 in the second half to record a 24-20 win ... Washington State jumped out to an early 14-0 lead before Stanford rallied to outscore the Cougars 33-3 in the final three quarters ... Stanford outscored its final two opponents 80-21 as the Cardinal won a pair of one-sided games, 42-21 over Cal and 38-0 over Michigan State.

**POST-SEASON HONORS:** Several Cardinal players earned post-season honors in 1996 led by junior defensive end **Kailee Wong**, named First-Team All-Pacific-10 Conference ... Wong was also named Honorable Mention All-American by Football News as well as being selected the team MVP and the Sun Bowl Most Valuable Lineman ... Earning Second-Team All-Pac-10 honors were senior offensive guard **Brad Badger** and junior ILB **Chris Draft** ... Stanford had five players earn First-Team Academic All-Pac-10 honors in 1996, including fullback **Adam Salina**, wide receiver **Damon Dunn**, defensive end **Bryan Werner**, cornerback **Leroy Pruitt** and kick return specialist **Marlon Evans** ... A complete list of all award winners for the 1996 season is listed on page three of this press release.

**RB TANDEM:** RB **Mike Mitchell** was Stanford's most productive running back in 1996, accounting for 809 yards rushing and 207 yards receiving on 23 catches ... He also led the team in touchdowns scored with six and all-purpose running with a 92.4 yards per game average ... Mitchell finished fifth in the Pac-10 in rushing (73.5 ypg) and seventh in all-purpose running (92.4 ypg) ... He had three 100-yard rushing games in '96, including a season-high 147 yards on 22 carries against USC, 127 yards on 24 carries vs. Cal and a 121-yard, two TD game vs. Oregon ... He had just one carry for (-1) yard in the first half against USC, but came on to register 148 yards in the second half in Stanford's

24-20 victory ... After four games this season, Mitchell was averaging 41.5 yards per game while receiving an average of 10 carries per game ... He hadn't scored a TD either ... In the final seven games of the regular season, he gained 643 yards on 104 carries (6.2 ypc) and scored six touchdowns (four rushing, two receiving) ... His per game averages over the final seven games were 91.8 yards and 15 carries ... Mitchell now has 1,849 career rushing yards and is No. 4 on the Cardinal's career rushing list ... He is fifth on Stanford's career all-purpose running chart with 2,984 yards ... Teammate **Anthony Bookman** is seventh all-time in rushing with 1,723 career yards and sixth in all-purpose running with 2,790 career yards ... The Cardinal rushed for a then season-high 220 yards in the regular season finale against Cal, then came back in the Sun Bowl to record another season best of 257 yards rushing ... Bookman led the way for the Cardinal with 103 yards on only 11 carries while Mitchell added 74 yards on 16 carries.

**SECOND HALF DEFENSE:** The Cardinal defense was outstanding in the second half of its final five games of the 1996 season ... Not only did the defense allow just 30 points (6.0 ppg), but it gave up just 126 yards rushing (25.2 ypg), 479 yards passing, 605 total yards and intercepted six passes ... Stanford trailed at halftime against the Bruins and Trojans and were tied in the WSU game ... The defense held opponents to just 1.7 yards per rush in the second half and 38-of-83 (.458) through the air ... The numbers for the Cardinal defense in the second half of the last five games of the '96 campaign:

**KAILEE'S CORNER:** Junior defensive end **Kailee Wong** was Stanford's only First-Team All-Pacific-10 Conference selection in '96 and the first Cardinal defensive lineman to be so honored in a decade ... Wong, who finished tied for second in the Pac-10 in quarterback sacks with 12 and third in the league with 21 tackles-for-loss, became the first Stanford defensive lineman since Tony Leiker in 1986 to be named First-Team All-Pac-10 ... He was also named the team's Most Valuable Player ... In the Norwest Sun Bowl, Wong accounted for 10 total tackles, two quarterback sacks, three tackles-for-loss and one pass deflection while being named the game's Most Valuable Lineman ... Wong's 63 total tackles was tops on the team among defensive lineman ... He was named the Pac-10 Defensive Player of the Week on Nov. 25 following his performance against Cal in the Big Game ... In the game, he had six tackles, one quarterback

## NOTEBOOK

- Junior **Damon Dunn** broke two school records in '96 and was again one of the most feared kickoff return men in the country ... Dunn set Stanford records for career kickoff return yards (1,384) and most career kickoff returns for touchdowns (three) ... His career kickoff return average of 26.6 ranks second all-time at Stanford ... In 1996, his 27.1 return average placed him third in the Pac-10 and 11th in the nation.

- Senior FL **Brian Manning** finished his storied career No. 5 all-time in receiving yards (2,280) and No. 10 all-time in receptions (140) ... Manning led the team in receptions in '96 with 37 to go along with 383 yards and one TD.

- Through the first seven games of the season, the Cardinal scored 13 times in 22 trips in the *Red Zone* - a scoring percentage of .590 ... Stanford scored just five TDs in those 22 trips, a TD percentage of .227 ... Conversely, in the final five games of the year, Stanford scored at a .714 rate in the *Red Zone* (15-for-21) while improving its touchdown percentage to .523 (11 TDs in 21 trips).

- Turnovers played a key role in Stanford's five-game winning streak ... The Cardinal committed just six turnovers while causing 17 during this time ... In the first seven games, Stanford committed 20 turnovers while causing just 16 ... Another way to analyze the turnovers is that Stanford was averaging 2.85 turnovers per game through seven and just 1.2 in their final five.

- Stanford averaged 12.7 points per game through its first seven games in 1996 (89 total points), but 31.6 points per game in its last five (158 total).

- The 19 interceptions by the Cardinal defense is the most at Stanford since the 1988 team picked off 21 passes.

- Stanford's third down conversion percentage was .239 after seven games (23-for-96), but .453 in its final four contests (34-for-75).

- Ten different Cardinal defenders intercepted at least one pass in 1996, including NT **Pete Swanson**, DE **Kailee Wong** and DT **Carl Hansen**.

sack, three tackles-for-losses and one interception ... He returned the interception 53-yards for his first career touchdown, giving Stanford a commanding 17-0 lead ... Wong started 14 games on the defensive line during his first two seasons (seven each in 1994 and '95), but elevated his play in '96 and became one of the top defensive linemen in the conference ... In Stanford's final five wins over UCLA, USC, Washington State, Cal and Michigan State, Wong registered 34 total tackles, 14 tackles-for-loss and 7.5 quarterback sacks ... Wong was also named an Honorable Mention All-American by *Football America*.

**LONG DISTANCE:** One of the reasons for Stanford's success offensively the final five games was its ability to score from long distance ... In those five games, Stanford scored nine touchdowns from 27 yards out or more, including seven from at least 50 yards ... In six of the Cardinal's seven wins, Stanford scored at least one TD on a big play ... Sophomore FL **Troy Walters** and junior WR **Damon Dunn** accounted for seven of those plays with the defense adding the other two ... Stanford's big plays in the last five games:

**IMPROVED DEFENSE:** The Cardinal defense improved in virtually every statistical category in 1996 ... The '96 Cardinal defense recorded more sacks, interceptions, forced fumbles and fumble recoveries while allowing fewer yards and fewer points than its '95 counterpart ... The Cardinal ranked ninth in the Pac-10 in 1995 in total defense (412.6 ypg), but improved to third in '96 (353.5 ypg) ... Also, Stanford's 34 sacks and 3.1 yards per rush in '96 compared to 20 sacks and 4.3 yards per rush allowed by the '95 unit ... Compare the numbers from 1995 to 1996:

## DID YOU KNOW...

• FL **Troy Walters** has come on in the second half of the season to become one of the team's top offensive threats ... Walters, whose father Trent is an assistant coach with the Minnesota Vikings, has caught 21 passes for 291 yards and two touchdowns while returning a punt 75 yards for a TD in the last four games ... Walters had just 11 catches for 153 yards after the first seven games, but his eight reception, 144-yard effort against UCLA in game eight was his coming out party ... Stanford head coach Tyrone Willingham was on the same Viking's staff as Troy's father Trent.

• FS **Tim Smith** proved to be one of the Cardinal's top young defenders in 1996 ... Smith, a former prep quarterback, was converted to wide receiver before being switched to free safety prior to the '96 campaign ... He has responded to his new position by being one of the most active players on the field ... He led the team in interceptions with four while also recording three quarterback sacks, three tackles-for-loss, five pass breakups, one forced fumble and one blocked kick ... He will replace Josh Madsen as the team's free safety in 1997.

**THE QUARTERBACK:** Sophomore **Chad Hutchinson**, a two-sport athlete at Stanford who was drafted in the first round on the Major League Baseball draft in June, 1995, was named the Cardinal's starting QB on Tuesday, Sept. 3 and made his collegiate debut Sept. 7 vs. Utah (23-40, 265 yards, 1 TD) ... In the last four weeks, Hutchinson has completed 73-for-114 (.640) for 824 yards and six TDs ... *In Stanford's six wins this season, Hutchinson has completed 117-for-175 (.673) for 1,372 yards and eight TDs ...*

Hutchinson doubles as a pitcher on the baseball team, where he earned First-Team Freshman All-America honors last year as the Cardinal's No. 2 starter in the rotation (7-2, 3.51 ERA) ... He redshirted in football in 1995 as a true freshman ... During his high school days at Torrey Pines HS in San Diego, Hutchinson played linebacker as a junior and did not play quarterback until his senior year ... He played 12 games at QB his senior season and completed 85-of-183 for 1,441 yards and eight TDs ... He was selected 26th overall in the first round of the 1995 June Major League Baseball draft by the Atlanta Braves ... He turned down the Braves' offer of \$1.5 million to play football and baseball at Stanford ... Hutchinson joins an elite group of Stanford quarterbacks who started their second year on The Farm ... The last QB to start in his second season was **Steve Stenstrom** (now with the Chicago Bears) in 1991 ... Others in the group include **John Elway** in 1980, **Jim Plunkett** in 1968 and **John Brodie** in 1954 ... Some of the great baseball-football players in Stanford history include Elway, **Toi Cook** (now with the Jacksonville Jaguars), **John Lynch** (Tampa Bay Bucs) and **Brian Johnson** (catcher with the San Diego Padres).
